Project in Angola



Ophthalmology in Angola is a huge challenge. Nationally, there are 94 ophthalmologists. Of these, almost 90% are concentrated in the capital – Luanda, leaving rural areas with little support. Of these 94 ophthalmologists (registered in the order of doctors), only 58 are nationals, the others are cooperating doctors. Overall, there is 1 ophthalmologist for about 350,000 inhabitants, when the WHO recommendation is 1 ophthalmologist for 10,000 inhabitants.

In 2022, CBM have deepened their commitment in Angola and strengthened our partnership with IONA, the National Institute for Ophthalmology.

The 2nd laboratory microscope was delivered, unpacked and tested by IONA in October. This microscope, along with the first, creates the infrastructure in the experimental lab, or "wet lab", which is helping to reduce surgical training time, as well as make gains in surgical skill and dexterity, subsequently helping to keep the trainee safer.



Ophthalmology textbooks were sent to IONA from CBM. This allowed the trainee doctors to study quickly. Many of them had already gained a working knowledge of English and could access training in international books. Due to the limited training available in Portuguese, doctors in Angola typically can't access international books or training.

Outreach campaigns intensified in 2022, making people living in the suburbs of Luanda more aware of the help available to cure their cataracts. IONA carried out visual screenings and cataract surgery campaigns on important dates, such as World Glaucoma Day and World Vision Day.

Three newly qualified ophthalmologists completed their training using the laboratory materials donated by CBM to IONA and successfully completed an intensive training internship in cataract surgery in The Gambia.

Cataract kits for 1000 patients, shipped in 2021, were used to perform more operations. The total number of cataract surgeries increased by 83% when compared to 2021, from 1,283 to 2,352 in 2022

CBM Luxembourg donated 50,700EUR to the Angola project in 2022.

Project in Madagascar – CDV



Working together, Fondation CBM Luxembourg and CDV (Centre pour le développement de compétences relatives à la vue) have completed a successful installation of auxiliary aids for visually impaired students at a school in Madagascar.



CDV Luxembourg had upgraded a series of auxiliary aid equipment for its students and, subsequently, had a lot of equipment that was to be left obsolete since it was not convenient for the integrative approach. This equipment, was still in perfect working order and had many years of use remaining. The Director of CDV Luxembourg, Frank Groben, wanted to initiate a way for this equipment to be put to good use.

Working together with President of CBM Luxembourg, Diane Wolter, a school in Madagascar was identified.

The school identified for these aids was the EPHATA school of the ECAR Center, run by sister Chantal Ruppert. The school has 53 students, all with some visual impairment or blindness.

From March to June 2022, the arrangements were made, including delivery and shipping of the equipment. Meanwhile, the team at CDV carefully packed the equipment, which covered 275 aids in 173 boxes weighing 2700kgs. The shipment safely arrived at the EPHATA school in August 2022.



In late October 2022, two volunteers from the CDV, sponsored by CBM Luxembourg, visited the school for 10 days. Their mission was to check and install all of the equipment that had been shipped. During the visit, the volunteers from the CDV instructed and gave detailed guidance to EPHATA school specialists regarding the use of equipment. They spent time with staff and children to see the equipment in use, making sure the full benefit could be realised by the school.



When the volunteers left, the equipment had already begun being used on a daily basis at the EPHATA school, with many students benefiting from the auxiliary aids. During the trip, some children were identified as having treatable problems, such as cataracts.

This project has been a huge success for both CDV and CBM, as well as the school, putting to use equipment that would otherwise have been obsolete.

The eye healthcare situation in Laos is urgent; the last study on avoidable blindness, 2017, showed that only 54% of the required cataract operations have been performed.

CBM Luxembourg, working through CBM Switzerland, has supported projects to expand eye healthcare in Laos in 2022. In terms of goals, the total number of patient consultations was reached; 38,000 in the capital, Vientiane, and 15,400 in the South.



The quality of cataract surgeries was realized, as were patient satisfaction goals. The 10 ophthalmology nurses and optometrists candidates have been selected and training has started in 2023, with the aim to be complete by end of 2024.

CBM continues to build more accessibility and inclusivity into the eye health care program, with successful cooperation with two organizations for better outreach to people with disabilities. The inclusion training "Orientation and Mobility" was completed by 27 people, while information was distributed about treatment options for eye problems over the radio and through brochures.

CBM Luxembourg donated 40,000EUR to the Laos project, 12% of the total project budget for 2022.

Madagascar

Healthcare in Madagascar is inadequate; there are only 31 eye health centers in all of Madagascar. 3% of Madagascar's population live with a visual impairment, around half of them with cataracts. Half of the people with cataracts are children with congenital cataracts. Children must have cataract surgery in good time, otherwise they will irrevocably lose their sight.

CBM Luxembourg supports CBM Switzerland, who lead the work in Madagascar. Overall in 2022, more eye operations were performed on children than planned; 580, or 110% of our goal. Additionally, significantly more patients from very poor families were also reached; 497, or 330% of the goal.

Focusing on training has continued. The completion rate in the training of staff in ophthalmology is over 160%, including eye nurse training, an optometry training and a low vision training.

CBM Luxembourg donated 55,000EUR to the Madagascar project, 16% of the total project budget for 2022.




